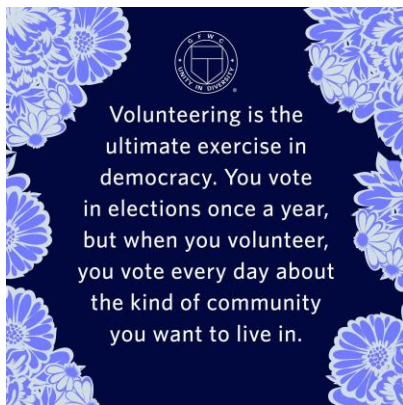

We’ve had more than our usual share of **winter weather** this year and I’ve gotten some questions about ice on the roads. The City of Berkeley Lake pays our landscaper to treat icy patches on Mansions Parkway approaching Bush Road and on Ridge Road approaching North Berkeley Lake Road where people could slide downhill into oncoming traffic. The City Council has studied and discussed this for years and been advised by police and emergency management personnel not to encourage people to get out of subdivisions and onto the roads when they are dangerous. We weigh the expense to your taxes in the risk/benefit discussion. Since our city’s roads are so hilly and curvy throughout, it would be quite expensive to treat the whole city, only to get people out a day or two earlier, especially when the police are urging us to stay in.

At our January meeting of the City Council, two important things happen that I want to share with you. Some years back the Council spent significant time working to arrive at a mutual agreement on conduct and ethics for ourselves. We felt so strongly about this commitment to each other and to our citizens that we made it a part of our city ordinances and policies. The policy requires that each year the **Code of Conduct** should be publicly reviewed and recommitted to by all council members. I’m proud of this document, and I urge you to find time to read it for yourself. It talks about conflicts of interest, use of city resources, accepting gifts or favors, transparency, and much else. It makes me as Mayor responsible for insuring that no one at our meetings makes personally disparaging remarks or reflects negatively on the character of others, as opposed to expressing a different point of view respectfully. When civility elsewhere in our society seems to be eroding and governments struggle to accomplish things, it is not an accident that our little city works so well. There is a second thing that happens at the start of each new year. The **Mayor makes a list of appointments** for the council’s approval. You can read those [here](#) and I urge you to do so in order to understand, as a citizen, who’s responsible for what around here. You will find the names not



only of our staff, but an appointed liaison on the City Council to each neighborhood who can help you as needed. You will find the names of some wonderful volunteers on our committees who help look after our greenspaces, who study and advise regarding the city’s finances and others who support our city in many ways. I hope you will find the words to thank these neighbors of yours when you see them, because as the pace of life increases, volunteers are harder and harder to find, but their work is still so important. A friend who is an outstanding public servant shared this with me from the Federation of Women’s Clubs. I am very grateful for ALL of our volunteers!

As I have reported in a previous Mayor’s Message, **Gwinnett County is celebrating its Bicentennial this year.** Part of that involves runners carrying a commemorative Torch to important locations throughout the county, in the manner of Olympic torch runs. I have been working with Charlotte Nash, County Commission Chair, and Judy Johnson, Mayor of Lawrenceville to make arrangements for the run to come through our city. The torch will arrive here in late October and spend the night at our City Hall. I will give you more details as the time nears.

My **Hometown Hero** for this issue seems an obvious choice, since I have already been writing here about her efforts for our city. **Susan Hanson** is a certified Master Gardener who has led our



Berkeley Lake Conservancy for years, and that’s a very important job.
