

I go to lots of meetings around the metro area to try to keep up with issues of importance and I am disturbed to keep hearing about **human trafficking**. I have learned that the Atlanta area, especially in the suburbs, has a growing problem with this. A total of 3,600 kids are sold into modern-day slavery every year in Georgia alone, and the average age of a human trafficking victim is 14.8 years. Georgia's First Lady Marty Kemp says, "The criminal enterprise behind this national operation is strong, well-funded and organized. Awareness and education are key in combating this evil." I urge you to learn as much about this problem as you can, and if you see something, say something.
