Our city has scheduled both a general and special election for November 4, 2025, to fill the expiring terms of three council members and the unexpired term of one council member. If you are interested in running, please stop by City Hall between the hours of 9 AM and 4 PM Monday, August 18 to Wednesday, August 20. There you will be able to pay the necessary qualifying fee a of \$27 and file the necessary paperwork. Here's the qualifying packet for more information. Advance in-person voting will be available in City Hall from 9 AM until 5 PM on the following dates: October 14-18, October 20-25 and October 27-31. On November 4 the polls will be open in City Hall from 7 AM until 7 PM. If there is a runoff, it will take place on December 2. If you need to register to vote in this election, you need to do that on or before October 6. As you can see, we will need a lot of help to manage all these hours of the election process, so, if you are interested and able to help, please contact Leigh Threadgill who is our election superintendent and absentee ballot clerk. She can answer any questions about the election process.


Our Electronics Recycling Event is scheduled for October 4 from 10 AM until noon at City Hall. We can only take household items on that day, because our guys are not prepared to handle

City Council has voted to increase the **maximum fence height** in side and rear yards to 8 feet and removed time limits on temporary fencing for gardens. This is meant to mitigate the adverse impacts of deer in your garden.

Road improvements recently authorized by City Council will continue next week with milling and resurfacing in Berkeley Field followed by Berkeley Commons. The



contractor, Garrett Paving, plans to start Monday, July 21 on Lakefield Bend. City Council also approved a change order to the project for the contractor to make some small repairs to improve road conditions on Lakeshore Drive, Ridge Road, Berkeley Walk Point, and Frederica Road. The application of High Density Mineral Bond, a pavement preservation technique, in River Mansions was completed in June.

According to the National League of Cities: "areas with poor tree correlate coverage with higher energy consumption and higher levels of air pollution. For every dollar spent on tree maintenance, \$5.82 were garnered in benefits in the form of energy savings, carbon dioxide

removal, air pollutant uptake and release, rainfall interception and property values."
